**Happy New Year!** 

For most people new years generate New Years' resolutions that seem to get thrown by the way-





## One of the five initiatives of the Lions Clubs is youth development.

In 2022 Districts 20N, 20E2 and 20Y (the Buffalo, Finger Lakes and Syracuse districts) raised over \$3000 to support the Junior Olympics of the Niagara Association of USA Track and Field. Those monies were used to conduct the Association 2022 Junior Olympics at Nazareth College. Funds also helped pay for grants to three Western New York youth track clubs, a Clinic Weekend (5 sites) on cross country in August 2022 and the Clinic Weekend (10-12 sites) to be held this March 2023 throughout Western New York.

The Niagara Association (black circle on NYS map) consists of the four Lions Districts of Syracuse (20Y), Finger Lakes (20E2), Rochester (20E1) and Buffalo (20N). I have received permission from the District Governors to contact the individual clubs within each District to see if they would be willing to participate in this project.

As was done last year, I am asking each club for a \$100 donation. More will be accepted if your means allow. Monies will be used as discussed above. Additionally, this year the Niagara Association is sponsoring youth clubs to conduct a 6-week Run, Jump and Throw program that will begin around May 1, 2023, throughout the Niagara Association and in all four Lions Districts.

My "marketing plan" for the project will include a snail mail letter to each club, a monthly email to a club official and a monthly update in each District's newsletter.

## Lions Clubs International Foundation Update





## **North Rose Lions**



- It is not a common sight, but it's also not surprising for people driving the streets of this village or the roads of Yates County to see 10 or so men installing a wheelchair ramp at a home.

The Community Betterment Handicap Ramp Committee is a signature program of the Penn Yan Lions Club, and the group's co-chairman beams with pride when talking about

"I've been doing this for 13 years now. Putting in these ramps are some of the biggest projects we do," said Don Willmott, who chairs the committee with local resident Norm Koek. "The Lions Club has been putting in ramps for many years, but it has really picked up recently."

In fact, the period from August 2021 to August 2022 was the busiest ever — 20 ramps were installed and four removed. That followed 19 ramp installations the previous

"Since I've been involved, we have built 162 ramps and removed 90. Many of these are temporary ramps and we use treated lumber, so we recycle them if they are not too weathered," Willmott said. "We also do aluminum ramps. We have had 396 works days in the last 13 years."

Lions are known throughout the world for their work to improve the lives of the visually impaired and to prevent avoidable blindness. Lions KidSight USA Foundation is the nation-wide program that brings Lions clubs across the country together to ensure children receive eye screenings and follow-up care. According to Lions KidSight, one in three young children have poor but correctable vision, often just needing eyeglasses. Lions Kidsight USA is chaired by Dr. Edward Cordes of Steuben County, who the Watkins-Montour Lions say has been a valuable resource. Dr. Cordes attended the Watkins-Montour Lions holiday meeting and commended the club for its good work.



While the Lions Club provided the specialized camera and trained personnel, school nurses Wendy Hatch and Jennifer Hoose facilitated the organization, parental communication, and follow-up for the vision screening. Lion Steve LoPresti, a retired Watkins Glen teacher, said that almost all the students were able to complete the screening with ease and that it was very satisfying being able to help children. Lions President Rod Weeden spoke highly of the collaboration and the ability to screen children at such a crucial stage of their learning.

Recognizing how important visual screenings are for young children, the Watkins-Montour Lions Club says it will continue to foster its relationship with area schools and child care centers to ensure children have poor vision identified and corrected.
