From the Desk of Russ Ebbets 2VDG

While the Holiday Season can allow one to become distracted from "other" goals I somehow managed to juggle all responsibilities and continue to move forward with things I am trying to accomplish with the Lions Club and my role as Second Vice District Governor.



Last autumn I spoke at the 20E2 Fall Conference on COVID Restart - Member Retention. My presentation, with Penn Yan Lion Judy Jones, included a 20-minute workshop that produced multiple ideas on how to implement the conference attendees' suggestions. Suggestions were divided into four general categories and were printed in the December 2021 District 20E2 newsletter.

The Union Springs Lions Club has already run two "New Member Spotlight" pieces (one of the Fall Conference suggestions) in the club's newsletter which asks new members 15 questions allowing other club members to get to know them better.

We have also produced a one-age "first year road map" that details our club history, meeting protocols, club officers and a suggested first year "to-do list" to get new Lions service minded.

As 2VDG I have visited almost all the northern Zone clubs of 20E2. It has been entertaining and awe inspiring to hear about the many different types of community service individual clubs provide for their communities. Each club has graciously given me 10-minutes to summarize the Junior Olympic-Lions program that 20E2 supported during 2021 and answer any questions as to the how's and why's of the program.


One of my goals for 2022 has been to increase the participation of the Lions of Western New York (District 20Y – Syracuse, District 20E1 – Rochester, District N – Buffalo and District 20E2 – Finger Lakes) with the JO program. I contacted the DG's of all four districts and requested permission to individually contact the clubs in each District. I'm happy to report all four districts have given me the okay and by the time you read this article I will have made initial contact via email with each District regarding the Junior Olympic program. My plan is to follow-up with a snail mail copy of the request letter and to send a monthly reminder to each individual District's newsletter.

The Niagara Association of USA Track and Field (WNY from I-81 to Buffalo and along the Southern Tier) has over 25 youth clubs. In early January I contacted each club to see if they would be interested in participating in a 6-week run, jump and throw program. The Run, Jump and Throw program (RJT) is a skilled movement program that literally teaches the proper biomechanics to run, jump and throw. Thirteen (13) of the clubs from throughout WNY responded positively. My plan is to use the Lion monies to purchase equipment necessary to conduct the program. Additionally, I am producing a brochure with a cognitive component to the RJT program that will emphasize good decision making, diet and nutrition and life skills that will blend in with Bloomfield Lion Michael Donohoe's diabetes prevention initiative. In sum it will be a busy tail-end of winter and early spring.

Please take a minute to review the Junior Olympic sponsorship request elsewhere in this newsletter and encourage your club to participate. I've set a goal of 25 clubs from throughout 20E2 (last year we had 17 participate) with a \$100 donation or whatever your means allow. If there are any questions, feel free to contact me via email or phone. Stay well and all the best.

January 15, 2022

One of the five initiatives of the Lions Clubs is youth development.

In 2021 District 20E2, the Finger Lakes Region raised over \$2000 to support the Junior Olympics of the Niagara Association of USA Track and Field. Those monies were used to conduct the Association 2021 Junior Olympics at SUNY-Cortland. Funds helped pay for rental fees, the timing service, a stipend for the working Boy Scouts, reduced entry fee for the meet and sale of \$5 meet t-shirts with the Lions logo on the back.

The Niagara Association (black circle on NYS map) consists of the four Lions Districts of Syracuse (20Y), Finger Lakes (20E2), Rochester (20E1) and Buffalo (20Y). I have received permission from the District Governors to contact the individual clubs within each District to see if they would be willing to participate in this project.

As was done last year, I am asking each club for a \$100 donation. More will be accepted if your means allow. Monies will be used as discussed above. Additionally, this year the Niagara Association is sponsoring 12 youth clubs (at his writing) to conduct a 6-week Run, Jump and Throw program that will begin around May 1, 2022, throughout the Niagara Association and in all four Lions Districts.

My "marketing plan" for the project will include a snail mail letter to each club, a monthly email to a club official and a monthly update in each District's newsletter.


Lion's Club Vision Clinic- Children's Day

INCREASE GLOBAL AWARENESS: Service data helps people understand the needs of communities around the world. Global minded Lions identify opportunities and lead their local communities into actions.

PAVE THE WAY TO PARTNERSHIPS: Service reports provide tangible evidence to prospective partnerships of Lion's International's global engagement and impact. These relationships strengthen the organization and yield benefits at the local level.

UNCOVER THE BIG IDEA: Because service activities are scalable, one small service project can become the next signature initiative of the organization: but only if it is reported and promoted by Lions!

ENHANCE OUR SUPPORT: -Service data-along with peer-to sharing and feedback from Lions-enables Lions International to identify best practices that can be shared globally.

BUILD A BRIGHTER FUTURE: Measurement leads to insight which in turn sharpens our focus, setting higher and more reachable goals. Each year both unifies and mobilizes the organization toward growth.


