


Junior Olympics update for March

April 2, 2023

One of the five initiatives of the Lions Clubs is youth development.

In 2022 Districts 20N, 20E2 and 20Y (the Buffalo, Finger Lakes and Syracuse districts) raised over \$3000 to support the Junior Olympics of the Niagara Association of USA Track and Field. Those monies were used to conduct the Association 2022 Junior Olympics at Nazareth College. Funds also helped pay for grants to three Western New York youth track clubs, a Clinic Weekend (5 sites) on cross country in August 2022 and the Clinic Weekend (6 sites) to be held this March 2023 throughout Western New York.

The Niagara Association (black circle on NYS map) consists of the four Lions Districts of Syracuse (20Y), Finger Lakes (20E2), Rochester (20E1) and Buffalo (20N). **I have received permission** from the District Governors to contact the individual clubs within each District to see if they would be willing to participate in this project.

As was done last year, I am asking each club for a \$100 donation. More will be accepted if your means allow. Monies will be used as discussed above. Additionally, this year the Niagara Association is sponsoring youth clubs to conduct a 6-week Run, Jump and Throw program that will begin around May 1, 2023, throughout the Niagara Association and in all four Lions Districts.

My "marketing plan" for the project will include a snail mail letter to each club, a monthly email to a club official and a monthly update in each District's newsletter.



Get Lions ready for the Lion Portal

We're preparing for the launch of the new Lion Portal. This refreshed experience will combine the functionality of MyLion, MyLCI, Insights and other tools into one cohesive and consistent experience.

To use the Lion Portal, Lions must have a unique email address (one that isn't shared with another member) in their Lion Account information. Additionally, phone numbers can no longer be used as log in credentials.

Here's how you can help Lions:

Spread the word. Make Lions — especially those who actively use their Lion Account — aware of the transition to the Lion Portal. Encourage them to make sure their member information is up to date and includes a unique email address.

Prepare club officers. Ask club officers to review the member records for their club, checking for any shared email addresses, and be prepared to help members update their information as needed.

Stay up to date. Check for news and updates on the Lion Portal webpage.

Lion Portal Important Dates!

7/15/23-7/24/23: Target Conversion Date

Before 6/15/23: Enter all club officers for 2023-2024

Before 6/15/23: Enter service activity for events prior to 6/1/23. Reporting for 6/1/23 going forward will be in the new system after conversion

Before 6/15/23: Record any club or donations to LCIF are in the bank with the appropriate supporting documentation for recognition.

Before 6/15/23: Make sure club data is accurate for this year (2022-2023). For Example, new members, sponsors, new clubs formed, transfers and other end of year activities specific to clubs are correct and recorded in MyLion/MyLCI

- Make sure every member has an email listed and no shared emails can be used in the new LIONS PORTAL
- Make sure member birthdays are entered since birth dates in MyLCI will be converted - even the old conversion 1/1/1900 date! Hint: in MyLCI under reports run "Member Information Update Report" and have your members update their info!
- Training is slated to begin in late April 2023 Stay tuned!

Global Service Team (GST) Report from Lion PCC Gary

April 1, 2023

At 9 months into this Lions year, our clubs (35 clubs with 839 members) have served 144,446 people, with a total of 15,926 volunteer hours, and provided donations of \$78,399 which is up 50% of what I reported in January. For 2021-2022, we reported 178,046 people served. I know that clubs are doing much more service than has been reported.

2 clubs that have not reported any service activities this year are: Twin Cities, and Weedsport. These 2 clubs have not reported any activities in the past 3 years. I could really use some help encouraging these clubs to report. We show that 90% of our clubs have reported. We are a bit low because Penn Yan and Lansing Leo Clubs have not reported any service. Without the Leo Clubs included, our reporting rate is 94.3%.

At the multiple level, District 20-E2 accounts for over 18% of the total people helped in the multiple with only 6.4% of the membership. We are the highest reporting % district (90%) which is outstanding! Can you imagine what it would be if 100% of our clubs reported 100% of what they did?

If any of your clubs are having difficulties with the Lions Clubs International Member Portal or any of the apps (MyLCI, MyLion, Insights, Learn and Shop) please let me know. I have District Administrator privileges for District 20-E2 and can fix a myriad of problems and can help clubs with service reporting or making member changes. I am no longer providing training on the MyLion / MyLCI programs due to their impending demise.

LCI is rolling out the new Lion Portal sometime after July 1st. It is being designed using the Sales Force platform. From what has trickled out, service and membership reporting for this Lions year will be cut off on June 15th. Clubs will only be able to report service activities for dates up to June 1st. Any service in June will need to be reported once the new system goes live. Unfortunately, there will be no advanced training available – it will become available after the launch date. The takeaway is that all clubs need to keep their membership and service activities up to date.

Hi Lions KidSight Database users,

I hope all is going well with each of you and you are back to doing robust children's vision screening.

The first part of this message is a reminder that the Project SEE CLEARLY 2022 Top Ten awards for 2022–23 require you to enter your screening data into our database. Only those who enter screening info there will be eligible for the prizes. I have put the description of the contest and awards for your use on the following pages. Some of the highlights of this description are that

- The data entered through May 30, 2023 will be counted and
- There will only be three club level recognitions per multiple district reporting.

If you want your club to be eligible for recognition the data must be entered as a club level screening and not part of the aggregate reporting by a district or multiple district.

Another item I want to bring to your attention is that some Lions have noticed that occasionally screening data is entered and shows up when searching for that event, but does not always appear when asking for a report. This occurs when the event's time span is designated as extending from one month to another. i.e. January 20 – February 10. In this case if you ensure your report query extends past the ending date for the event your data will be properly reflected. If your report query ends prior to the end of the event the data will not be reported. For instance if your event ends on Feb 10 and you ask for a report as of January 31 the event will not be displayed. If you ask for a report through March 1 the event will be displayed.

One other item that has been a minor issue is that if you are just getting caught up in your reporting the system will prevent you from adding a new event beginning prior to October 1, 2022. This defect is being worked on. However, for now, if you are entering data previous to that just use October 1, 2022 as your start date. I am working to get this fixed.

On behalf of all of us working with Lions KidSight I thank you for all you are doing for children's vision screening. You are truly making a huge difference in the lives of children of your communities.

A PERSONAL EXPERIENCE

From Lion Gail Cordes, LCIF District Coordinator

In February, PID Ed and I were fortunate to join a group of about 20 other Lions from the US plus Lions from the UK and Greece, to help the Lions of Kenya in a Global Week of Service. During this project the group did a diabetes screening, did vision screening on almost 2000 children including many attending a special Olympics event, planted trees, and helped feed the children in two schools, including a Masai school. Soccer balls that emitted sound were given to each of the students at a school for the blind and visually impaired. Wheelchairs were donated to a school for physically challenged students. Young women in several schools were given enough hygiene kits to last a year so they wouldn't have to miss a couple of days of class each month. All of this was funded by a grant from LCIF. District Governors from Delaware and Kenya teamed up to sponsor the grant request.

The experience was overwhelming, humbling, inspiring, and motivating.

If you have been thinking about donating to LCIF, there is no time like the present. Whether you donate to the disaster relief fund or one of the service areas, or just to the general fund, the need is there. Between the war in Ukraine, the earthquake in Turkey and Syria, the floods in Brazil, or any of the other world-wide disasters, many emergency assistance grants have been disbursed. There is also a continuing need to fund projects involving childhood cancer, diabetes, vision, hunger, and the environment. Last year over \$35 million dollars were given in grants around the world, including almost \$4 million in the US.





Recent research from John Hopkins reveals hearing loss is linked with walking problems, falls and even dementia.

In a study that tracked 639 adults for 12 years, John Hopkins expert Frank Lin, M.D.PHD and his colleagues found that mild hearing loss doubled dementia risk, moderate loss tripled the risk, and people with severe hearing impairment were 5 times more likely to develop dementia.

This information is a good reason for all of you to get your hearing tested. Please refer people in your community who are in need to the Foundation so we can help them get the hearing aids they need.
